FROM THE RABBI Esther Hugenholtz

There is a paradox that the blessings in our lives are often the hidden or unapparent ones. We rely on these blessings and take them for granted: clean, running water from our tap, electricity, a warm home, a body that (mostly) does what we need it to. Family members who love us, friends who support us. We make it through each day stabilizing our lives through the dependency these things offer us. As Joni Mitchell once sang 'you don't know what you've got till it's gone.' This is why most major wisdom and faith traditions around the world, including our own, focus on a gratitude practice. 'Modah/Modeh/Modet ani lefanecha Melech Chai v'kayam', we say in the mornings, 'I gratefully acknowledge before You, enduring and living Sovereign', '...shehechezarta bi nishmati b'chemlah, rabah emunatecha' – 'for You have returned my soul to me with kindness - how abundant is Your faithfulness to us!'

Just like God is invisible to the world (as the Book of Esther hints at) through 'hester panim', the theological concept that God hides God's essence from us so that we may uncover it, the things that keep our synagogue a community are also often from our view. This applies to many social institutions and as a beneficiary of Iowa City's excellent school district, I marvel at the smooth and intuitive operation of my children's schools. *We don't know what we've got until it's gone*.

This is why I am very grateful to David Lubaroff, our President, for writing his clarifying piece on how our synagogue's governance works. This is not innate knowledge; in fact, not even in rabbinical school did I learn about Boards and Bylaws and term periods and communal management. Yet our synagogue runs, smoothly and gently, through an often-invisible small army of volunteers, lay leaders, professionals and donors. Every part of this operation requires intentionality, strategy and a greater perspective. From the Weekly Email that lands in your inbox to the lox we put on our bagels after services. In a sense, a synagogue is like the government of a small village; direct democracy in action, a place to incubate not just deep spiritual truth and warm belonging but also civic duty.

As I have passed my seventh year for Agudas Achim, I never cease to be amazed by this small army of lay leaders, professionals and donors that keep us going and growing. Even when Moses was battling the Amalekites, his hands were held up supportively by others. Yitro dispensed good management advice. And the Talmud has many stories of synagogue management; on how to steward the collective coffers and kitchens of the community, on how to fundraise for a new building (yes, donor plaques existed in the Roman era too!) and much more. Likewise, our team hold up our synagogue, its operations and its soul. Knowing how this system works, why it is important and how you can contribute it guarantees our continuity.

Of course, the mission of a synagogue is to not merely guarantee its continuity: it is so much more. But we cannot realize our mission without the *(Continued on page 2)*

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guarantors of community. In a time of much political and economic upheaval, the soft-spoken stability of who we are is a true gift. We have been here for over a century and hope to be here the next century too. There is a role for everyone to play, from President to occasional envelop-stuffer, High Holiday greeter, Oneg-supplier, or just to see your smiling faces walk through the door. I feel grateful that we can know what we have got, and we will continue to build it and keep it going.

FROM THE PRESIDENT David Lubaroff

Dear Congregants:

I have less than 4 months remaining in my two-year term as president of Agudas Achim Congregation. In some of my monthly pieces distributed as part of the monthly Bulletin I have written about our rabbi and the lay leaders that make up the board of directors and how they work together to benefit our synagogue and its members. The four months run-up to the next president and board prompted me to write this piece on synagogue governance, who are involved and what are their responsibilities. But first some history and background on the subject.

A synagogue is known by a few different names, such as *beit k'nesset* (literally, House of Assembly), synagogue, shul, and temple. A synagogue is a beit tefilah, a house of prayer, a beit midrash, a house of study, and a social welfare agency. These terms seem to simplify the modern functions of today's Jewish house of worship. I consider our synagogue, Agudas Achim, more than a house of prayer, study, and welfare. It also functions as a house of education that is separate from the traditional religious school where our children learn the Hebrew language and history and prepare for their B'nai Mitzvot. Our adult education committee, chaired by Lisa Heineman, offers many programs that continues and expands on Jewish topics. Agudas Achim also offers a well-stocked library, housed in a beautiful and functional section of our

building. Teresa Weiner continues to monitor the current collection, adding new books as they become available. We also offer many lifeenhancing activities such as Talmud study, yoga, "Warm Up America," and Mahjong. Thus, it functions as a gathering place for the Jewish community, a JCC without the pool and exercise equipment. We exercise our minds and let them grow through stimulation much like our muscles grow from physical exercise.

A synagogue is governed by a board of trustees (or just board) composed of lay members of the congregation. According to the current by-laws of Agudas Achim the following people make up the board: rabbi, president, vice president, presidentelect, secretary, treasurer, all of whom constitute the executive committee of the board. The remaining members include chairpersons of the following committees: ritual, social, adult education, education (religious school), tikkun olam, membership, and youth, plus three at-large positions and the principal of our religious school. In addition to the standing committees, we have the following ad hoc committees that are not members of the board: facilities, library, art, technology, kitchen, caring, grounds, cemetery, and others who fill crucial roles in our synagogue community.

The board of Agudas Achim works with our rabbi in a sacred partnership. A sacred partnership is a (Continued on page 3)

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committed relationship that is built on trust, respect, and communication and, in our case refers to a relationship between the rabbi and board as well as our congregants. Our partnership has been operating under two important words, Trust and Collaboration, as developed at our board retreat in 2023. Although the lay leaders on the board are responsible for synagogue governance and the rabbi is responsible for the religious and spiritual activities, Rabbi Hugenholtz and the current board truly work in a sacred partnership, mostly through executive committee and board meetings as well as a biweekly meeting with the president, presidentelect, and administrator, Although there seems to be a separation of duties for the rabbi and the board, we all work as a collaborative group.

Synagogues do not work in a vacuum without guidelines and sources of important information. Each Jewish denomination has its associated organizations. Because Agudas Achim is dually affiliated with the Reform and Conservative movements, we have access to the offerings of the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) and the United Synagogues for Conservative Judaism (USCJ). We have utilized both the URJ and USCJ to enhance our governance with their offerings to the congregation. Jewish leadership has evolved over time. Since the destruction of the Second Temple in 70 CE, there has been no single organization or group that has a leadership position over the entire Jewish diaspora.

Prior to the 18th and 19th centuries a loose collection of learned rabbis governed the dispersed Jewish communities. Great parts of Central Europe accepted the leadership of the rabbinical Council of Four Lands from the 16th to the late 18th centuries. With the development of the secular modern world, and as Jews were welcomed into non-Jewish society, Jews began to leave the Jewish ghettos in Europe, and simultaneously rejected the traditional roles of the rabbis as communal and religious leaders. Following the Renaissance there was an assimilation with the cultures of the Jewish diaspora which continued to minimize roles of rabbis in governing synagogues. Synagogues are, for the most part, independent community organizations. In the United States, at least, individual synagogues do not answer to any central authority. In the modern world of synagogues, the separate, but collaborative governance of secular and religious duties are described earlier in this message.

Many of us face the problem of having too many things to do in life, and this leads to a paucity [or a lack] of congregants who volunteer to serve on the board. It is difficult to offer such positions to congregants that have no previous board or committee experience. I have considered organizing a board boot camp where we would educate members on what is involved in the lay leadership. Finally, our rabbi and lay leadership work hard on synagogue governance with full offerings for the benefit of all Agudas Achim members. We realize that one size does not fit all so we continue to plan new things, be they religious/spiritual, educational, or social. Our latest initiatives are aimed at the senior members and families of interfaith or blended relationships. Please keep reading the monthly bulletin and the weekly "This Week at Agudas Achim" emails.

SCHOOL NEWS Sonja Spear

March is all about Purim, so let's start with the exciting stuff! Purim this year will be a *wicked* good time.

School meets at the usual time on Sunday, March 9th. We'll hold the Purim spiel at 10:30 followed immediately by the carnival at 11:00 – 12:15. Of course, parents will come for the Purim spiel and stay for the carnival. But the spiel is not just for families. Everyone is invited! The Kosher Hams have been working very hard. They would love a warm audience to clap and laugh and sing along.

Grab some Hamantaschen or other treats at the annual **bake sale**. (Bring cash!) This year, the kids will use the proceeds to jump start their new Youth Group. Speaking of which, we could still use **contributions to the bake sale**. They don't have to be Hamantaschen. Anything you or your kids want to bake will be welcome. (*Ahem*. Rice Crispy Treats.) Just remember to include a list of any ingredients that are common allergens (tree nuts, peanuts, dairy, eggs, seeds).

Preparing for Purim has been intense in the last few weeks. Moreh Hersh puts the Kosher Hams through their paces. The kids learn their lines, reach for the high notes, and try not to miss their cues. Those not in the spiel made props and backdrops. The very youngest (Hannah and Avery's classes) learned the Purim story. Avery's class even created cartoons of each scene and taped it to the wall in the right order.

When Mal's class was not rehearsing, they were delving into the deeper meaning of Purim. Among the questions they pondered: Are we each nasty like Haman, brave like Esther, and foolish like Ahashuarus at some point in our lives?

Of course, we are still learning *tefilah*. We worked on the Torah service in the Fall. Now, we are turning to Kabbalat Shabbat. The whole school sang "Shalom Aleichem," a song greeting the Shabbat angels. But first, the kids all shook hands, saying "shalom aleichem" to each other. The proper response is "aleichem shalom." Rabbi Esther showed everyone how to wear a *tallit*.

Avery's class has been working hard on the alphabet. They have sung the alphabet song while taking turns pointing to the letters, focused on particular letters, and found those same letters in books. The Hebrew alphabet is hard to read, but I think they've got it! Hersh's class reviewed consonant-vowel combinations. They're about to start work on "Shalom Aleichem." Hannah's class made groggers and learned the Purim story. Mal's class has completed the Torah Service and is moving on the Kabbalat Shabbat.

But first, everyone learned "Yom Huledet Sameach" because last Sunday was Rabbi Esther's birthday! The school sang Happy Birthday to her in Hebrew and gave her an enormous card. The kids and teachers had a lot of fun sneaking around to get it signed without her knowing. It was a little bit of Purim joy at the end of February. Chag Purim sameach, everyone! Happy Purim!

COVID COMMENTS Bob Wallace, Barcey Levy, Jane Zukin

There has been a lot or respiratory infection activity in the Eastern Iowa community recently. The hospitals and emergency departments have been active. **COVID-19** is still circulating in the community, and according to CDC, deaths are still occurring nationwide. The usual vaccine recommendations are still in place. If you are over 65 years, CDC recommends that you receive a second shot of the current COVID-19 vaccine. Using the home test kits, available from pharmacies, is also still recommended if you become sick.

Right now, epidemic **influenza** is very active in Iowa and the local community, both in adults and children. If you've not had your annual influenza vaccine, it is not too late. Please see your health care professional about this vaccine if you have questions.

You may also have been hearing or reading about **bird flu**. This is another type of influenza virus that has been spreading around the world, mostly by migrating birds. It has been spreading locally and nationally in poultry flocks and other farm animals, which is why the price of eggs is so high. A few people have become sickened by this virus, likely spread by contact with poultry and other farm animals. Fortunately, this virus has not been shown to transmit among humans, but experts are concerned that this could happen in the future. <u>Vaccines for this virus are being made</u>, but they are **not available** to the public at this time. Also, people have asked if eggs are safe to eat because of this outbreak. There is no evidence now that bird flu is transmitted from eggs. However, uncooked eggs can spread other infections, such as Salmonella bacteria, and it is important that eggs be properly boiled or cooked for that reason. We will keep you posted on this issue.




CONGREGATIONAL NEEDS FUNDRAISER
