FROM THE RABBI Rabbi Esther Hugenholtz

When I was in rabbinical school, I remember a rabbi teaching me a valuable lesson: that Judaism is the project of building up a 'memory bank'. This applies to individuals, of course, as we build up our memory banks of Jewish life experiences, as well as the collective of our people. The image of building up a memory bank, whether it's through the Pesach Seders that we experience at home or through the collective narrative of the Exodus, has stayed with me. It makes the act of memory conscious and intentional. It asks of us to consider what we deposit in our own memory banks: happy memories, or hard ones, recent memories or those enveloped in the mists of time. And every once in a while, we get to withdraw a memory from our memory bank, finding renewed meaning in it.

Today (February 1) is my six month anniversary of starting officially as the Rabbi of Agudas Achim and I've noticed that over this last half year, I've started building up my own memory bank with our community. I still feel I'm in transition – as expected – but I'm also starting to feel like I'm consolidating my memories and experiences. Being launched into the High Holidays was intense but I look back on it fondly – what a way to be welcomed into the community! – and being a glutton for punishment, I must admit that I'm looking forward to our next High Holidays.

Our communal Chanukkah celebration was special too, including our first experience of Midwestern snow. However, some of my most precious memories is seeing the community come together, to celebrate simchas, to volunteer and to support our members in need. Becoming embedded in the community as a new rabbi includes officiating at funerals and shivah *minyans*, conducting hospital visits and receiving congregants at my office with a listening ear and a cup of hot tea. I've gotten 'stuck in' as the Brits like to say with the B-Mitzvah education and building one-on-one relationships with our teens is particularly precious. I learn as much from them as they teach me. Speaking of learning: the Introduction to Judaism Program has launched and we have a good crowd of a variety of adult learners joining us. If you're interested in sampling some of that, come talk to me.

There are committee meetings to attend, ideas to bounce around and new initiatives to set up: we have enjoyed two well-attended (and delicious) *Tu Bishvat* Seders at Hillel and at Brix which were co-organized between the multi-talented Hillel Director, David Weltman, and myself – and we have Purim in the pipeline. It's very exciting to see our relationship grow since we're both the 'new Jewish professionals' in town.

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One particularly precious memory was during one of our Family Chavurot (the potlucks, by the way, are phenomenal). I had gathered the children round the bimah for a short service under the attentive eye of their parents and we were singing, dancing and jumping with the guitar. Then it was story time and I read them from a new(ish) book called 'Almost a Minyan' (by Lori Kline and Susan Simon), about a young girl who lives in a community with a small synagogue and she gets to make *minyan* (the prayer quorum of ten). The kids were transfixed and I was so proud new, exciting ideas for Hebrew and Sunday School.

There are Memory Banks that all of us can pay into. The Ruderman Foundation, a Disability Advocacy Organization, has launched a training program to help evaluate our community's inclusivity and accommodation. This includes a March trip to Chicago for a training seminar. If you are passionate about the *mitzvah* of disability inclusion at Agudas Achim, be it mental health, cognitive or physical, please be in touch – we would love to have you on board to make our synagogue an empowering place for all.

There's plenty going on and we can all be proud of that. Arctic winters and visa delays don't seem to faze our plucky congregation in the rolling fields of Iowa. I look forward to building many more, happy memories with you all.

Small Group Meetings Begin

Our first small group meeting with our new Rabbi, for *Musical Jews*, will be held Thursday, February 8, 7:00-8:30 PM at the synagogue. To assure ample discussion time for participants, the group will be limited to 12 attendees on a first come first served basis. Call the secretary to register. (We will schedule a second session if there is additional interest.)

About Small Group Meetings

Small group meetings can provide opportunities to meet with the rabbi within a small group of members who share your interest. We will provide a series of "Small Groups With Interest" to investigate the possibility of building and strengthening connections within our community.

This will provide you a way to get to know the rabbi and also to meet like-minded others. Examples of such small groups already exist in our congregation. The Young Families' Chavurah has recently formed and meets one Friday night each month for a dairy potluck meal at a group member's home or the synagogue. The Talmud Study Group, Free Lunch Team, Warm Up America, and the Sisterhood Members & Friends Monthly Lunch Out are examples of existing groups. The Book Group and Mussar Reading Group are groups which have come and gone and may come again. Sisterhood is a large group that also builds connections.

Through this program a small group of individuals might meet just one time, to become acquainted with the rabbi and congregants like themselves, or attendees might decide to meet on a regular basis.

We are initially piloting a small set of affinity groups to gauge members interest in opportunities like these. Small Group cohorts are becoming popular in Jewish communities across the country. Ruderman Disability Inclusion Initiative

Agudas Achim has been invited to participate in the Ruderman Foundation's Disability Inclusion Initiative. Through this program, we will learn methods for proactively meeting needs of disabled members and visitors. We will survey members to determine unmet needs, conduct an audit of the present state, and learn best practices and form a Disabilities Inclusion Committee. Security Upgrade

We are currently investigating the addition of video surveillance of the interior and exterior areas of our building. In part, this is in response to the actions of the National Alliance, a neo-Nazi organization that leafleted a diverse south side neighborhood of Iowa City with White Power fliers. It is also in response to the November thefts that took place in our building. We are sad to think that a member or visitor may have been responsible. While we are happy that no further thefts have occurred, we will take these steps to deter thefts or vandalism of our property.

New CAJE Seminar

This August our Rabbi and Principal will attend this national seminar focusing on excellence in Jewish education. Rabbi Hugenholtz, Sonja Spear and the Education Committee will meet with parents to learn their issues and priorities in preparation for the event.

Hebrew School

I have started teaching the **Beginning Class** on Mondays. We learned to ask each other's names in Hebrew. That sets us up for a lesson on Hebrew names. Then we will practice being called to the *bimah* to read from the Torah.

The **Second Year class** has been designing T-shirts for the whole school to wear when they lead services. They have also been working on Lecha Dodi and and other Kabbalat Shabbat songs. The **Third Year class** has been focusing on the Keddusha as well as practicing to lead services.

The **B'nei Mitzvah** are mostly working individually with Rabbi Hugenholtz or with me to polish their skills in leading services.

Sunday School

The whole school learned about Tu B'shvat. The kids got a snack of dates and learned to say the blessing over the fruit of the trees. (Most kids ate the dates. But I also found a few squired away in surprising places.)

All of the classes discussed the importance of trees in the environment and as sources of food and shelter. The **Fourth and Fifth Grades** then created a family tree from Abraham and Sarah to their own families. The **Kindergarten** created birdfeeders out of seeds and kosher (we checked!) gelatin. The rabbi led a workshop on the meaning of the bar mitzvah ceremony with the **B'nei Mitzvah**.



FROM THE STACKS Ellen Caplan

In the Polish city of Lodz, the brothers Ashkenazi grew up very differently in talent and in temperament. Max, the firstborn, is fiercely intelligent and conniving, determined to succeed financially by any means necessary. Slower-witted Jacob is strong, handsome and charming, but without great purpose in life. While Max is driven by ambition and greed to be more successful

than his brother, Jacob is drawn to easy living and decadence. As waves of industrialism and capitalism flood the city, the brothers and their families are torn apart by the clashing impulses of old piety and new skepticism, traditional ways and burgeoning appetites, and the hatred that grows between faiths, citizens, and classes. Despite all attempts to control their destinies, the brothers are caught up by forces of history, love, and fate, which shape and, ultimately, break them.

First published in 1936, *The Brothers Ashkenazi* quickly became a best seller. Breaking away from the introspective shtetl tales of classic nineteenth-century writers, I. J. Singer brought to Yiddish literature the multilayered plots, large casts of characters, and narrative sweep of the traditional European novel. This edition was translated by Joseph Singer, and includes an introduction by Irving Howe. Find it in the Braverman Library at Fic/Sin.
