FROM THE RABBI Rabbi Esther Hugenholtz

As we are looking towards the summer (you, know, that thing that follows winter in Iowa) and we are taking summer vacations, we can use this space to reflect on what has been a busy, productive time. Summer in the Jewish calendar has traditionally been a quiet time, probably because going anywhere and doing anything in the heat of the Land of Israel was a tall order: and that sounds like good advice in the Midwestern heat too. The summer calendar lists the 17th of Tammuz (remembering the breaching of the walls of Jerusalem by the Romans) and Tisha b'Av (the 9th of Av which is the date that the Romans destroyed the Second Temple in 70 CE) so it has been tempting to see this quarter of the wheel of the year as reflective, contemplative and even a little contrite as we prepare for the High Holidays. While we are not facing the historical challenges that our ancestors did in the Land of Israel, it does make psychological and emotional sense for us to use this time to take stock. As for me, I've already started thinking about the High Holidays and the theme I would like to bring to our community as your Rabbi. The theme, which I will talk about more in future articles over the next few months is 'Be a Blessing': in what way can we be a blessing to ourselves, to those around us and the entire world? I don't want to give away the goods too soon but would like to 'plant' this idea in all of us as we move into a quieter, more reflective time of year.

I, too, have been reflecting a great deal on my first ten months in this pulpit. This past weekend was pretty representative for the blessings this congregation has given with already. Thoroughly enjoying our Scholar-in-Residence, Rabbi Juan Mejia, we had a wonderful set of days: a soulful, traditional Kabbalat Shabbat service, a lively and engaging personal narrative from Rabbi Mejia, a musical Reform Shabbat morning service with some more great words of Torah from Rabbi Mejia, while in the afternoon, we buckled down to play Dungeons and Dragons at the synagogue: a 'pilot' project to perhaps bring in more gaming and games afternoons into the Shabbat afternoon slot. On Sunday morning, Rabbi Mejia brought us insights from his emerging Jewish communities from Latin America and on Sunday afternoon, we got to enjoy the silver-tongued Dr. Cargill in his capacity as Auctioneer at a wonderful, fun, familyfriendly Auction to raise funds for our security system. I myself might have spent a bit of money on a gorgeous sterling silver Tiffany dish – I couldn't resist and it was for a noble cause. It is only appropriate to recognize the many volunteers and staff members who pitched in behind the scenes to make the Auction go without a hitch. Thank you all for your incredible hard work. All in all, it was wonderful to see our congregation come together for this wide range of events: the spiritual, the communal, the social and the intellectual.

As summer pushes on, we are starting to complete the cycle of the year. This year's Bar and Bat Mitzvah students are in full swing and I'm taking tremendous pleasure and pride in seeing them shine and making their birthright their own. The Disability and LGBTQ Inclusion Committee at the synagogue has been launched with the help of the Ruderman Foundation and the USCJ (if you want to join, please do!) My Introduction to Judaism class is in its home stretch and my students are becoming more apt at decoding Hebrew and wrestling with transformative Jewish ideas. I am proud to say that I am finalizing my candidates' conversion to Judaism: a first time for me as a congregational rabbi in the United States. We as a community look forward to welcoming our new Jewish

siblings with open arms. Sonja Spear and myself will be attending NEWCAJE, a world-renown educational conference in Hartford, Connecticut, so we can come back with new ideas for our Hebrew and Sunday school education. I will also be teaching (and representing Iowa City) at Limmud Chicago/Midwest in August which I am very excited about. Likewise, I had the pleasure and honor of doing a Pulpit Swap with Pastor Bill Loving last month, where we preached at our respective pulpits and I gave a talk on the Brexit Referendum three (!) times (at the Iowa City Foreign Relations Council, the University of Iowa Retirees Association and at Oaknoll). What all these events and projects have in common is that they are manifestations at a process at work: of deeper integration, connection and relation. It's been a fulfilling and rewarding experience to make this community our new home.

So as I look to summer, to my vacation and my garden, to the High Holidays in the not-so-distant future, I feel richly blessed. There is much going on and more in the woodworks. If you want to get involved: as a volunteer, a Torah reader, a student, a congregant, a questioner, a setter-upper of the Oneg on Friday nights or Saturday mornings, a participant on committees or whatever it is, just come and find me. I'm not going anywhere.

Have a wonderful, nourishing, restful and reflective summer.

Songs of the Holocaust

Please disregard that the vocalist and I are married. The voice and the accompaniment are beautiful and heartfelt. The songs were written by artists and composers at the Terezin concentration camp, most of whom did not survive, but their artistry displayed a courage to illuminate even the darkest, most brutal and sorrowful circumstances. The first song, "Ich weiss bestimmt, ich werd dich wiedersehn," (I know for certain that I will see you again) by Adolf Strauss, might be heard as a lovely song about two lovers reuniting, but the composer was eventually executed at Auschwitz. Imagine the despair and suffering and hear the expression of hope. One survivor, Norbert Glanzberg (1910-2001), wrote songs in memory of those who



perished. The liner notes include an essay about the prison camp at Terezin, biographies of the composers and poets, and full texts and translations. Rachel has performed these songs at the United Nations, the Illinois Holocaust Museum, and numerous universities and synagogues. Find *Songs of the Holocaust* in the Braverman Library at CD/Classical/Vocal/Holocaust.
