FROM THE RABBI Esther Hugenholtz

Don't tell my children, but I've been wrapping gifts on the sly. It's our family's practice to scour Chanukkah gifts in the run-up to the season and anything's game: tchotchkes, clothing, markers for drawing and of course some big-ticket items for the last day. I'm just done decorating our house, inside and out, with the kind of Chanukkah kitsch that supports the Jewish micro-economy and adds a little blue-and-white cheer to the dark days of December.

There is nothing wrong with a little 'self-care'; and that is what we need — as a community and as individuals. Gift-wrapping and decorating fills me with glee but it also does something deeper: it allows for the creation of sweet family memories as we stock our memory banks with the things that give us joy. There's no denying that it has been a strange and stressful few weeks in the

wake of the Pittsburgh season, and taking care of our own needs is the right thing to do. Judaism codes for this concept – it's called 'shemirat guf', the mitzvah of taking care of one's body, and by extension one's soul. During Chanukkah, we get to do that: rededicate our inner lights and lives to a renewed sense of Jewish purpose but in a lighthearted, cozy, relaxed, family-oriented way.

Over the next few months, we'll get to nourish our souls (and bodies) in different ways. I'll be kicking off the Chanukkah season with a Chanukkah Story Time at the Iowa City Public Library on December 5 at 10:30 a.m. It is a first time for the Library and a great opportunity for us to showcase our Jewish values and our presence in the wider community so I'm very excited for doing this. At the tail-end of Chanukkah, we are enjoying our scholar-in-residence, Dr. Emile Schrijver, Director of the

Amsterdam Jewish Historical Museum. I'm very proud to welcome my landsman to the New Country and we will hear him speak on a number of important historical and contemporary topics: the fate of Judaism in the Golden Age of the Netherlands (early modernity) as well as a keynote speech on commemorating the Holocaust in these turbulent

times. Please support the community in welcoming Dr. Schrijver so that we can show him some Midwestern hospitality.

When the holiday season has passed and the fairly lights and channukiyot are packed away, the month of January will present us with an opportunity of learning. I will be relaunching my Introduction to Judaism program on Monday,

January 14, at 7:30 p.m. at the synagogue. The course runs for a year, is free and is modular. If you want to brush up on your Jewish knowledge and get to know both fellow congregants and newcomers in an intimate setting, this is your chance.

A little further down the line we have Tu Bishvat and Purim to think of, but we are also thinking about doing something new. I had the pleasure of teaching at Limmud Midwest + Chicago this past summer and forged new bonds and friendships. Limmud is a peer-led international festival of Jewish learning that is characterized by its radically inclusive and egalitarian spirit. The Limmud Midwest team, Hillel Director David Weltman and myself are now looking at bringing a 'Taste of Limmud' to Iowa City in the spring. If you are excited to engage with Jewish culture, food, text, music and spirituality in an informal setting, please consider joining the Steering Committee of

Iowa City Limmud or consider attending the day when we have set a date. We will keep you posted!

In short, there's plenty going on. Just because there's a lull in the Jewish calendar doesn't mean we need to miss the chance to build a fulfilling, rich Jewish life here in Iowa City. The weather may be cold, but

there's plenty to keep us warm in the winter months ahead.

FROM THE PRESIDENT Kathy Jacobs

I write this as I sit in the synagogue foyer ushering for Hebrew School. I find I really enjoy the task. The children bring such joyful energy into our space.

As you probably know, while we are working through options to increase building security and develop new safety processes, we are keeping our doors locked. We are providing ushers to welcome members and visitors for services and events which take place outside our office hours.

If any of you would be willing to usher during a Friday or Saturday service, or during Hebrew School or Sunday School, please let the office or me know. As a frequent usher myself, I have been grateful to those of you who spell the person ushering so they can enjoy part of the service. You know who you are; thank you!

Dave Middleton has volunteered to chair an appointed committee to assess our risks, identify options and make recommendations to the board and membership. Members who have appropriate experience may contact him to join the committee or to provide information and advice. This process is already underway, and I'm grateful to those who have already stepped forward to join or be consulted.

On November 27th, Agudas Achim hosted rabbis and lay leaders affiliated with the Iowa Jewish Professionals organization for their fall/winter meeting. I was happy that some of our board and our administrator were able to attend. The meeting agenda included a presentation by Jeremy Sroka, Critical Infrastructure Protection Coordinator with the Iowa Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management, "Protecting your facilities and your congregants at prayer."

We learned of multiple resources we can contact to obtain an assessment of our facility, current safety processes, and readiness to respond to threats. Jeremy also shared information about grants from U.S. Homeland Security administered through his agency that might become available to help pay for physical improvements to our building. He also informed us that local county emergency managers are responsible for communicating the availability of grants to religious organizations. We will certainly make contacts there.

I was grateful that Dave Middleton was present because we not only learned a great deal about methods and practices, but we were able to hear from other synagogues and federations about their practices and plans. Although Jeremy assured us that the events at Squirrel Hill did not result in any heightened level of alert for our area from the FBI and other agencies monitoring threats to Jewish organizations, we all welcomed the information he provided.



SCHOOL NEWS Sonja Spear

Hebrew School

The Hebrew School has just completed the first semester of experimenting with a new approach to teaching Hebrew. We have adopted (and adapted) the Onward Hebrew curriculum, which emphasizes learning vocabulary through movement. We also spend a lot of time practicing *tefilah* (prayer) and delving into the meaning of prayers.

If you were to come by and look in the classroom (please do!) here is what you might see: Teachers giving commands in Hebrew and students carrying them out. Some of these are silly (put the book on your head and spin around), some are simple (point to the bride). In all cases, the point is to learn key nouns in a given prayer.

A little later that same day, you might see the kids illustrating the vocabulary with their own pictures. The students working on *Lecha Dodi* (Come, Beloved) from the Friday night service drew a picture of a bride. The students learning the *Va'ahavta* (You Shall Love) prayer of the *Shema* drew a picture of a heart. Each picture was labeled with the appropriate Hebrew

word. The teacher put these pictures on the wall so that the students can point to them as they practice vocabulary. We are building quite a word wall.

I did a quick evaluation last week and found that every student responded correctly to the Hebrew command to point to a particular picture, for instance a picture of a *kallah* (bride). They could also point to the Hebrew word, even when it wasn't associated with a picture. In other words, they could both understand and read particular words as sight words.

When students read or practice prayers, my hope is that these words will serve as islands of meaning and familiarity in a wash of Hebrew. I know that I do not have time to teach them enough Hebrew to understand every word of a prayer. But they should have enough of the key vocabulary to remind them of the overall meaning of what they say.

Sunday School

Meanwhile, in the Sunday School we try to introduce one Hebrew letter a day. This coming Sunday is brought to us by the letters *Het* (for Hanukkah) and *Nun* (for *ner*, candle). Since several Sunday School classes have made candles for Hanukkah, they will have the opportunity to (pretend) to light their candles while saying the phrase *l'hadlik ner*, to light a candle, which will lead naturally to practicing the prayers for lighting the Hanukkah candles.

The **Kindergarten** has been learning about the Maccabbees and making a Hanukkah menorah with their handprints.

In addition, the **Fifth Grade** has been working hard on famous Jews and immigration, especially to lowa. I asked them to begin by finding as much information as they could just by exploring the

synagogue. They read the articles on the wall, went through the names on the memorial board to find the earliest inhabitants, and looked at the pictures of past B'nei Mitzvah classes. Then they supplemented their information with what they could find on the web. They're pulling it all together into a big poster, which I will put in the hall.

The **whole school** will be making decorations for the synagogue's Hanukkah party on Sunday, December 2. We're looking forward to seeing everyone there!



FROM THE STACKS Michael Sellz

Old Men at Midnight by Chaim Potok



It's not often a book can affect you on a deeply emotional level, and this is such a book. Chaim Potok's prose is simple and colorful with underlying visceral connections to humanity. There are three stories, or novellas about a woman (Davita from the previous novel "Davita's Harp") whose life touches three different men: a Holocaust survivor studying English and rediscovering his repressed creativity, a Russian ex-KGB officer who extracts confessions from the innocent in Stalin's time and comes to terms by writing his story in detail, and a well-published university professor of War Studies facing his own mortality through his wife's illness and impending death (and the ghost of his childhood Torah teacher).

Through the gloom and despair, Davita offers the hope of understanding your own narrative and the promise of redemption that lies within. Potok is a master Jewish storyteller, and the stories of these lives will linger on beyond the last page. Find **OLD MEN AT MIDNIGHT** in the Braverman Library at Fic/Pot. During December, it will be the "Featured Item" on the "New in the Library" shelf.

DR. EMILE SCHRIJVER, DIRECTOR OF THE AMSTERDAM JEWISH MUSEUM

"AMSTERDAM'S JEWISH GOLDEN AGE"



Dr. Emile Schrijver visits Iowa City at the invitation of the United Nations Association and Agudas Achim in commemoration of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights of 1948. He will speak about Amsterdam's importance in Judaism as the home of the first religiously impartial state and of a Jewish community that took creative part in the European Renaissance. Indirectly, this history has something to say about how our congregation came to have a Dutch rabbi.

Prof. Dr. Emile G.L. Schrijver (1962) is General Director of the Jewish Historical Museum and the Jewish Cultural Quarter in Amsterdam, as well as Professor of Jewish Book History at the University of Amsterdam. Dr. Schrijver is an expert on Jewish cultural history and scholarship. He is the executive editor of an Encyclopedia of Jewish Book Cultures. He serves on boards and advisory committees of numerous Jewish cultural organizations both in and outside the Netherlands.

Dr. Schrijver will also give remarks during Agudas Achim's Shabbat morning service on **Saturday, December 8 at 9:30 a.m.**
