### FROM THE RABBI Esther Hugenholtz

#### The Blessings of the Old and the New

Rabbi Abraham Isaac Kook was the first (Ashkenazi) Chief Rabbi in the Land of Israel in 1921, prior to the founding of the State of Israel in 1948. A mystical and contemplative figure, his contributions to Orthodox Jewish thought and Jewish spirituality as well as his openness towards and appreciation of secular expressions of Judaism make him a unique rabbinic figure. One of his key sayings, beloved across the Jewish world, is 'the old must be renewed, and the new must be made *kadosh* (holy).'

The concept of 'holiness' might be a little abstract to grasp but if you break it down to its Hebrew root word, K-D-SH (*kuf*, *dalet*, *shin*, like in the words 'kadosh', 'kiddush' and 'kaddish'), it means 'to set apart'. Another way of putting it is that we make things *special* by *demarcating them*. With the winter holidays behind us, and the secular New Year rung in, we have in our own minds started demarcating the old from the new. Whatever the year 2018 brought us, we are turning a new leaf with 2019 and it's wonderful that we Jews have a double opportunity to press the reset button in different ways: at Rosh haShanah and on January 1<sup>st</sup>. Judaism would assert, through its unique rhythms and


rituals, that life knows many points of transition, of crossing-over into a new state of being.

I certainly feel that way. 2018 passed in a flurry. It was a year of transition in so many different ways. Now, the future looks different for my family: we are thinking about buying a house in maybe a year or so. We are becoming more and more settled into the lowa City community. What was once new is now becoming familiar and comfortable.

Paradoxically, it is my increasing familiarity and comfort with our American life, my rabbinate in Agudas Achim and my relationships with the community that create the space to think about change and innovation. At a Board level, we are thinking about creating a Strategic Plan and we always welcome input from all of you about where we want to take our community and what is important to us. I'm experimenting with launching a Young(ish) Jew-ish Professionals Group and our first dinner is on January 9<sup>th</sup>, so if you are between the ages of 25 and 40 and either Jewish or feel connected to Jewishness, please join us. I'm also very excited for a full cohort of our Introduction to Judaism program to be launched on the 14<sup>th</sup> of January (and if you still want to join, do let us know). Our Hebrew School Principal, Sonja Spear,

As I approach the coming year I find myself thinking about the Mussar soul traits of Chessed (Lovingkindness) and Hakarat Ha'Tov (Gratitude). I have been on the receiving end of these values this past year through your acts of kindness and expressions of gratitude toward me and toward our community. I have also had an insider's view of many of your gestures of Lovingkindness directed to the whole community, and have received thanks on your behalf. You make me look good before our members and the world; thank you!

There are too many individuals and groups to recognize separately, but I need to call out two groups for their quiet, generous, and substantial voluntary actions. They are the ladies of Warm Up America (WUA) and the Caplan Family Free Lunch program.

Connie Berman recently reported the distribution of 18 finished Afghans to several organizations --

Ronald McDonald House, DVIP, Number One Firehouse (for use as needed), Shelter House, and two Habitat for Humanity houses that opened on North Dodge.

The Caplan Family, under the leadership of David Caplan, represents Agudas Achim, cooking and serving a monthly meal through the Free Lunch Program. We all receive the credit for their gesture.

There is a strong connection between these two Midot. Thank you to the women of the WUA and the Caplan Family. We and the world are better for your acts of Chessed.

To all our other volunteers, thank you so much for the unsung work you do.

#### **Board Update**

The board approved Shellie Smith as the replacement Youth Chair and Shelley Goffstein as the replacement Membership Chair. They replace Sarah Frank and Loraine Brenner whom we thank for their past service.

There is a newly appointed committee for Safety, chaired by David Middleton. This group will work with federal and local agencies to examine our current safety policies and practices, receive their recommendations, and evaluate our risks, with the goal of providing options to the board and our community. Please watch for information from this committee as they make progress on their work.

We are in the process of hiring a part-time nonmember person to monitor our locked doors during Friday and Saturday services. The doors will be unmonitored following services, so those who attend Oneg events following services should continue to arrive before services end.

## SCHOOL NEWS Sonja Spear

School is on break! But I would like to take a minute to share a new program that I am starting in January.

On **January 19 and 26**, students in **Fourth Grade** and above will attend a special class on Saturday (Shabbat) from 10:00 a.m. – 12:00 p.m. with the option of staying for lunch afterwards. This class will replace Sunday School for them.

The rabbi will offer a fun, interactive introduction to the Shabbat service in the first half of the morning. In the second half, the students will join an adult service paced with families and children in mind. The children's experience will certainly be much richer and more meaningful if they learn these prayers with their families, so parents are warmly invited to attend. Everyone is welcome with any (or no) experience with Shabbat services, Hebrew, or prayers.

This Shabbat program is an experiment in broadening and deepening families' experience of

Shabbat services. In the past, Hebrew School has been its own silo. Sunday School has been another, and the families who attend services regularly have been yet a third. I think that we will build a stronger, more vibrant community if we break down the silos. So this program is an experiment in blending. Parents who normally drop their kids off at school then pick them up and ask what they learned will, instead, learn with them. Kids who do not normally attend Hebrew School will have a taste of Hebrew prayer. Kids who do not normally attend Sunday School will discover that there are more Jewish kids in Iowa City than they thought!

It will also be a lot of fun. We will have a musical service with props. (I will email parents with information about the props soon.) And, because Judaism is all about food and community, we will have some great nosh afterwards.

I'm looking forward to seeing everyone there.

### SAFETY COMMITTEE Dave Middleton

Reflecting on the attack at the Temple of Life synagogue in Pittsburgh, the Board decided that is was time to review our own exposure to risk and the idea of a Safety Committee was born. Last month, the Safety Committee was officially established.

The Committee will assist the Board to maintain a safe and secure environment for the congregation's staff, members and visitors, and to protect them and the congregation's property against safety risks.

The Safety Committee aspires to:

- Keep our congregation welcoming and vigilant;
- Introduce visible safety precautions that are not intrusive;
- And implement ones that are reasonable and effective.

The Committee's approach will be comprehensive: from protective measures, emergency response, to continuity and recovery of our congregation's operations. It is concerned with your personal safety, the safety of our facilities and the protection of our congregation's data and information systems.

Chaired by Dave Middleton, the Safety Committee comprises five members: Janice Weiner, Joseph Braverman, Robert Amstrong and Jonathan Sabin.

#### The Safety Committee wants to hear from you


This month, the Committee will organize a Town Hall/ Walk-in meeting where it will explain its plans in more detail and listen to your feedback and input.

# FROM THE STACKS Dick Caplan

#### Just Revenge, a novel by Alan Dershowitz

You may hold an opinion already about this author—either favorable or the opposite, because he is famous, not as a novelist, but as a highly successful trial lawyer and Harvard professor. Indeed, that may not qualify him as a novelist, even if he thinks so, and if he'd presented this work of fiction to our UI Writer's Workshop, they might not have given him immediate admission. Even so, it's an excellent read to generate thoughts about the potential lack of justice for so many Holocaust criminals and what might be appropriate methods for revenge—if there can be any such—and its consequences. Dershowitz gives easy evidence of his personal training from Talmud study and its quiet application to his legal reasoning and its use in this sometimes tear-jerking story of an unusual sort of revenge that plays out in an exciting courtroom drama. Find <u>Just Revenge</u> in the Braverman Library at Fic/Der. During January it will be the Featured Item on the New in the Library shelf.
