FROM THE RABBI Esther Hugenholtz

I think it's happened, friends. I've become an lowan.

The temperature only needed to reach the high forties or low fifties for me to throw open all the doors and windows in my house, welcome in the streaming sunlight and enjoy sitting outdoors because it's 'warm'. While I am not the shortswearing type, maybe a few more years of 'lowa integration' will inspire more irrational behavior on my part. (Last year, I marveled at those people wearing shorts in March. I now respect them).

Spring has sprung and I can't wait for the last frost date so I can plant my seedlings and look to (a hopefully, successful) harvest of homegrown tomatoes and peppers. The Earth is awakening and Passover is on the horizon.

During an Introduction to Judaism lesson, I asked my students to reflect on what their favorite Jewish holiday is and Passover (with the High Holidays a close second) was a clear winner. I do love this time of year very much and it feels like our community is reawakening too: we are heading into a dynamic few months before things quiet down again for the summer. After a buzzing Purim Carnival (a shout out to Sonja Spear, our Principal, for pulling it all

together so beautifully), we look towards our Communal Second Seder. Alan and Nina Weinstein and their team will reprise their delicious brisket menu (with plenty of vegetarian and vegan options). It's always so heartening to see our community come together for this 'big' events and feel the vibrancy of our small-but-plucky community.

Apart from Passover, there's more exciting stuff lined up: we are honored to host the Concert of Commemoration after Passover ends. We have several interesting learning events in the works: on Islam by the eloquent Shams Ghoneim, the (now!) Spring Sisterhood Tea, and for Yom haShoah a talk on the Iowa Scattergood Hostel and their unexpected history housing Jewish refugees during the Second World War (by Michael Luick-Thrams). I'm excited to be doing some communal teaching over the next few months, including a session on belief and non-belief in Judaism ('God or Not') and in May, on Judaism and LGBTQ issues.

While I'm glad the snow has finally melted, I do look back on a productive winter. I have been honored to establish myself more in the wider lowa City (Continued on page 2)

community through a Habitat of Humanity Interfaith ground-breaking and several lectures on Judaism and anti-Semitism. In fact, I have an April lecture coming up at the College of Dentistry, of all places, where I myself receive my dental care. (Insert joke here). Our community has also seen tragic and difficult events: the desecration of the Church of the Nazarene comes to mind as well as the Vigil for the Christchurch Mosque shootings. It is good to know, however, that our tightknit lowa City community stands shoulder-to-shoulder to provide solace and solidarity in times of need.

I am also looking forward to attending my first CCAR ('Central Conference of American Rabbis')

convention in early April. The CCAR is the organizational body of the Reform Movement and the convention is an opportunity for me to network, build relationships, upskill and be inspired. I look forward to bringing back some rich Torah.

As for the coming time period: the gardening metaphor seems apt. It's all about sowing those seeds into fertile soil and trusting the elements to help with the rest. Adam and Eve were the Torah's first gardeners, and we can all metaphorically follow suit. Sow seeds, water our seedlings, nurture our immediate surroundings with love and continue doing what we are doing well. Bringing our local Jewish life to fruition.

That spring sunshine can't hurt either.

MICHAEL LUICK-THRAMS TALK

Michael Luick-Thrams: Thursday, May 2, 7:00 p.m.

In the lifetimes of our parents or grandparents, Scattergood Refugee Hostel saved over 80 Jewish lives from Nazi genocide by giving them a safe place in West Branch, Iowa. And then the Hostel tried to serve Japanese-Americans expelled from western cities... but altruism doesn't always meet smooth waters. Dr. Luick-Thrams will speak about the Midwest's mixed response to the refugee crisis of the Holocaust era, and then about projects in the Midwest to help integrate Jewish and other refugees from Nazioccupied Europe. His work includes 40-plus interviews



with refugees and other principals of the Scattergood Refuge.

Michael Luick-Thrams (Ph.D. 1997, Humboldt Universität in Berlin) divides his time between Germany and the American Heartland. He serves as executive director of a non-profit educational organization in each country—Spuren e.V. in German, and Traces here. He is the author of a recent genealogy-based Midwest social history, "Oceans of Darkness, Oceans of Light". Dr. Luick-Thrams' 2019 tour of midwestern institutions is supported by Humanities lowa and the National Endowment for the Humanities, the Center for Prairie Studies/Grinnell College, and the John K. and Luise V. Hanson Foundation and Vander Haag's Inc.

Shams Ghoneim:

Islam, A Short Review

Sunday, April 7, 11:00 a.m.

Islam gave to mankind an ideal code of human rights fourteen centuries ago. These rights aim at conferring honor and dignity on mankind and eliminating exploitation, oppression and injustice. This talk will address pillars, principles, sects, human rights, misconceptions, and commonalities with Judaism.



Shams Ghoneim was born and raised in Cairo, and has lived in Iowa City since 1967. She is a graduate of The University of Cairo College of Agricultural Engineering and the UI Iowa graduate college. She was a medical researcher for 32 years.

Ms. Ghoneim was a former President & Vice President of the ACLU of Iowa Board of Directors, current Coordinator of the Muslim Public Affairs Council (Iowa Chapter), a former Chair/member of the Iowa City Human Rights Commission, and a member of the Executive Committee of the Iowa City Mosque and Islamic Center. She is also past president of the Johnson County Consultation of Religious Communities.

On March 12, a representative from Homeland Security (DHS) conducted a four-hour site assessment of the Synagogue to consider vulnerabilities and possible solutions. The analysis covered many topics, including the exterior, hardening the foyer, receipt of mail, background checks and protecting our classrooms.

Unfortunately, the DHS report has been delayed due to flooding in the Des Moines area. It will serve as the foundation of our safety plan and FEMA grant application to address our safety needs.

We celebrated the last Erev Shabbat of March with a delicious family dinner before services. Afterward the Tikun Olam Committee provided a very moving Oneg Shabbat presentation by the NAMI board president, Leslie Carpenter.

April will be a busy month for us. The office has been busy preparing for Pesach and the annual Concert of Commemoration. Oven cleaning and the annual Kashering are scheduled and the children will search for Chametz after Hebrew School on April 17. The rabbi will officiate at our communal Second Seder on April 20. The Pesach guide details our Passover Services and communal Seder.

This week I am studying the Mussar soul traits of gratitude and generosity. I'm reminded of the opportunities we have to show gratitude for all that






FROM THE STACKS Frank Salomon

Yiddishkeit: Jewish Vernacular and the New Land, by Harvey Pekar and Paul Buhle.

Yiddishkeit means 'Jewishness' in a secular sense, peculiar to transatlantic Ashkenazim of the last two centuries. To quote Wendy Wasman of the Jewish Book Council: "If editors Harvey Pekar (z"l) and Paul Buhle had only included the history and emergence of Yiddish culture, dayenu! If they had only introduced readers to the Yiddish press and poets, dayenu! If they had only included a snippet of drama, and not a full-length play, dayenu!" Their grand graphic-novel anthology brings us back into a lost creative paradise of Ashkenazim: a time when despite the poisonous environment of East and Central Europe, Yiddish generated a literary renaissance and a performing effervescence that lasted generations. Pekar and Buhle, and others, do honor to many stars we remember and love (Sholem Aleichem, Molly Picon, Jacob Glatstein). More importantly, they also bring alive geniuses of satire, melodrama, protest and mourning who have faded from American public memory: Der Nister, Abraham Reisen, Chava Rosenfarb, Kadya Molodowsky, Marvin Friedman and many more.



For us as Jews now living far from the wellsprings of Yiddishkeit, this book is like a draft of reviving vitamins. Where did our "geschmack," the American Jewish taste and manner, come from? Our fancy, our bittersweet hilarity, our reverent-yet-tragic view of life? Our ambivalent piety? Our biculturalism? Our ardent challenges to the order of things? So much of what we love is really relic Yiddishkeit. Agudas Achim's library has *Yiddishkeit* thanks to Joseph and Kineret Zabner – to them, a sheynem dank.
