FROM THE RABBI Esther Hugenholtz

Between the Suns

There's an interesting Halakhic (Jewish legal) term called 'bein hash'mashim', literally, 'between the suns'. This term refers to the twilight period at sunset, when it is neither day nor night and time feels fluid and hard to define. In Jewish law, this is a tricky period since so many of our mitzvot (commandments) are either performed during the day or the night. This in-between category causes some confusion. We simply don't know where we are but we know that nightfall is coming.

This is an excellent metaphor for the current moment. We are all waiting to exhale, eager to release the tension in our belly. It seems very fitting for where we find ourselves in the year. In a way, November is a 'bein hash'mashim' writ large; the time between Fall and Winter, where the veil is stretched thin as the world tips towards darkness. It is no small wonder that in the Northern Hemisphere at least, we have festivals of harvest, light and cheer to keep melancholy at bay, such as Thanksgiving and the Solstice Festivals, or that embrace the fear and uncertainty of our mortal lives, such as Halloween. In Judaism, this period aligns with Cheshvan, the month of silence, the only month when no Jewish holidays are observed.

We are waiting to exhale as we hurtle towards one of the most decisive elections of our life-time; not just for our country but for our world. We are waiting to exhale as we await the conclusion of Stage Three vaccination trials. We are waiting to

exhale as we ready ourselves for the second wave of the pandemic, as the light dims and we feel our isolation more keenly. There is so much loss of control in our current predicament and I know that I've been struggling with eight months of pandemic isolation. We are emotionally fatigued by all the heaviness and sadness in our world.

Still, Cheshvan makes way for Kislev, a bitterly cold month. And then, oddly, on the 25th of Kislev, we start to bring back a glimmering of hope and light as we light our first Chanukkah candle. Chanukkah, the little holiday that could: minor in the grand sweep of big Jewish ideas; compelling in our *kishkes* (gut) as we seek to take back control, curl our fingers around the darkness and push it away.

This is the time to fold into ourselves a little. For coziness, simplicity and reflection. But also for allowing us to take back control. The Maccabees took back control. And the oil burned for eight days because a brave Kohen (Priest) had the audacity to light the lamps in the first place, even though he knew there was not enough. But somehow, there always is.

As we look towards the glimmers on the horizon, we can imagine what is yet to come. One day, we will open up our building again; perhaps we will be guarded and hesitant. Perhaps we will still keep our distance and wear our masks. But just as we light lamp after lamp during the Festival of Lights, it is an

inevitability that we will be together once again. We just cannot determine the timeline or the format; we leave that up to the scientists. By that same token, perhaps we can take back control over this country's narrative and focus less on what divides us and more on what unites us. Perhaps we will find newer and better ways to talk to each other compassionately, to uproot ancient and entrenched injustices and to remember that, like the Maccabees of yore, we fought passionately for an imperfect vision of freedom that requires the constant unfolding of the generations. Perhaps in a life across this river of despair can teach us how to think more deeply about the world the pandemic leaves us. We are waiting to exhale, but after that, we can breathe deeply once again and dream.

As for myself and my family: we continue hunkering down, navigating the tedium of endless work Zoom meetings and online school (picture ten alarm clocks set at 30 minute intervals, five days a week),

the anxiety of attempting to stave off infection and the all-pervasive sadness of disconnectedness. We miss our community so much; we crave the simple pleasures of hugs and in-person meetings, of our kids playing with other kids, of corporate worship and indoor dining and of the plain company of other human beings. But we are also so thankful; to (still) be healthy and well (please, God!), to have each other, to be able to bring meaning, comfort and support to our community and to delight in the simple pleasures that are still accessible to us. Lit candles on a dark evening, blustery walks in nature, fresh bread at the dinner table, chapter books read as a family on the couch. We are 'bein hash'mashim', between the blending of the lights, tender and unsure of what we will encounter next. The winter will be hard, cold and dark in so many ways. But, we will strike a match, spark a flame and touch fire to a wick.

Stay strong, friends. See you on the other side, at the pillar of dawn, when the sun starts rising again.

FROM THE PRESIDENT Sue Weinberg

The secular year is slowly coming to an end. As I write this I am still deluged with political ads. I have already voted, and I urge you to vote also, no matter which party or candidate you support. And I hope that the upcoming election can bring our country together again, rather than tearing us farther apart.

We are in the Hebrew month of Cheshvan, which is a quiet month, it is the only month in the Jewish calendar that does not have a holiday. Well planned – giving rabbis a break after the plethora of fall holidays. That means that synagogue presidents and boards also get to step back and take a deep breath.

So with not a lot going on in the Jewish world, I would like to fill you in on some things that have been happening behind the scenes. I apologize that this is a bit longer than my usual column, but please bear with me.

First, a huge shout-out to our administrator Karen Brady and treasurer Mindy Russell. Early in the pandemic, we were given the opportunity to apply for a forgivable grant to cover salaries and building expenses. They worked tirelessly to get our application submitted, and we received a grant in the amount of \$42,600. Recently guidelines and forms became available to request loan forgiveness, and again Karen and Mindy worked to get the forms completed and submitted. We were just notified that we met the requirements and our loan was forgiven and marked Paid In Full!

Another shout-out to Janice Weiner and Dave Middleton, who researched and submitted a request for a Homeland Security grant which we were recently informed was awarded!! And to Mindy Russell, Janelle Jaskolka, and Dan Petchers, who formed a fundraising committee to solicit additional donations for further upgrades. Two letters have been sent to the congregation detailing the fundraising efforts and the proposed upgrades, including a door entry system that will allow us to

keep the building doors locked but also allow members to access the building during designated times, and bullet-resistant window coverings. Costs for these two upgrades will be covered by the Homeland Security grant and an anonymous donation in the amount of \$25,000. However, other upgrades have also been proposed which will need additional funding, so if you are able to, I urge you to donate to our Safety fund. If you did not receive the letters detailing the proposed upgrades please contact the office.

One last shout-out, to Curt Braverman, who as I mentioned last month, save our High Holiday services with his technical knowledge and equipment. The board has approved the creation of an ad-hoc Tech Committee, chaired by Curt, to look into all of our tech issues, including (but not limited to) making sure that information on our building's tech capabilities is documented for future availability, recommending tech upgrades and new equipment needed to stream/broadcast services, both remotely as we are doing currently and to continue streaming once we are in the building, and upgrading our website.

And one last update, on our Pandemic protocols. There was discussion at our last Exec Board meeting and full Board meeting about protocols for reopening the building. All agreed that now is not the time, with our high number of cases in Iowa and the expected spike due to winter and flu season. To help us decide when it is time to reopen, we will be consulting with local medical experts (some of whom are our members!), reviewing state and national recommendations (including from the CDC and my hero Dr. Fauci), best practices from the URJ and USCJ, and monitoring other local faith communities. We will keep you informed as circumstances change and evolve.

One of the things I like about the La Bri'ut (To Our Health) curriculum that the Jewish Education

Center of Cleveland developed just for online Sunday Schools is that it helps the kids learn to deal with COVID in a very Jewish way. It teaches a little Hebrew, engages a little Torah, and strengthens to bond between the individual and the community.

Community comes in many forms: a Shabbat service over zoom, a chat in the Sukkah while staying six feet apart, even a Sunday School class over zoom. It's not as good as meeting in person, but the more of these experiences we give our children and ourselves, the more secure and normal we feel.

It is not too late register for Sunday School! You can register here. I'm looking forward to seeing even more big kids with long hair next week.
