FROM THE RABBI

January and February are quiet months. Peaceful, some might say. Lonely, others might offer. Maybe it's a little bit of both. The snow has overlaid our world with a welcome serene calm, and at the same time, I have felt the solitude of fewer Jewish holidays and fewer ways to connect to each other. Even though the snow cover is thick, we can feel in our hearts the faintest stirrings of spring. In a world of white, we celebrated Tu Bishvat and I planted my first seeds, hoping to have homegrown microgreens, lettuce, arugula and cilantro for the Seder table.

Amidst the quiet, other things have been stirring too. Vaccines are finally ramping up and I am sure many of us oscillate between hope and anxiety; our world caught in a fierce race between innovative and safe vaccines and a mutating virus. It will be hard to predict how the next months develop and so while we are still in the metaphorical winter of this pandemic, it is important for us to sow the seeds of spring in our hearts. It is important to do what we Jews do so well: hold onto hope, cultivate community and choose life. We both seek to preserve the present and plan for the future.

As our President Sue Weinberg wrote in her article, we are pushing ahead with safety upgrades which will make our synagogue a safer place to be. A safer synagogue will also help us be a more welcoming community – they are complementary goals. I am grateful to the Safety Committee for all their hard

work and equally grateful to the members of our community who have donated so generously.

Other plans for the coming months are a joint Hillel-Agudas Achim Purim celebration where we will read both the traditional Megillah as well as have a fun-filled Zoom Purim spiel with the ominous but oh so contemporary name: 'Pandemic in Persia.' We are also gearing up for Passover, of course. The Second Seder will not be happening in person, but will be hosted on Zoom from my family's home. We will be using a beautiful, brand-new Haggadah published by the Reform movement, chockfull of poetry and meaningful readings to bring our Exodus experience into the 21st century. In order to enhance our Passover festivities, we are also planning Passover packages with a Haggadah on loan, a box of matzah, seasonal recipes and a Pesachdike sweet treat for all members who sign up. Closer to our current moment, the month of February has plenty to offer. I am launching a new Introduction to Judaism course on the 15th of February (sign up through the office) for anyone who wants to explore or deepen their connection to Judaism. We also have some fantastic Adult Education programming coming up so check the bulletin for that. And we are gently exploring 'virtually twinning' with a congregation in Boise, Idaho for programming and perhaps a service. The

blessings of the Zoom era allow us to look beyond our geographical boundaries and make new friends without any limitations.

As these cold months drag on, I have learned to 'lean into' the cold and am frequently found frolicking with my kids in the snow. At the same time, I am excited for Spring, for more opportunities for socially-distanced outdoors get togethers with friends and for more shots in arms to help us push back against this plague. As always, I remain oh so proud of how this community is navigating the pandemic. I often reflect how hard this all is; for those who live alone who feel the sting of loneliness; for those with families who crave a moment of peace. For those who work out in the community to risk exposure and for those who shelter at home who fear potentially severe disease. All of us are contending with the challenge of the age in different ways, yet of course it is our common humanity that underscores the importance of all our experiences.

When the Sea of Reeds split, the Midrash teaches that instead of two walls of water (with a walkway), there were twelve, separating each tribe of Israel from each other. The tribes could still see either other, but were divided and isolated from each other during that moment of calamity. This reminds me so much of the moment we are living through. We are separated by walls of water, or panes of glass, or electronic screens. We can see each other but we cannot touch—yet. But we are still with each other, sharing each other's experiences which is what the Midrash sought to underscore. Divided yet one.

Dear Agudas Achim family; meanwhile, if you want a friendly ear and a 'lev shomea', a listening heart to help lift your spirits please remember that I am here. Just a text message or an email away. I look forward to being with you in whatever way I can.

The story of the Midrash has a happy ending, of course. The Israelites safely made it across the short and were reunited once again. As we will be.

Dear Agudas Achim Congregant –

All of us are feeling the isolation imposed on us by the COVID-19 pandemic and need a little “pick-me-up” to keep smiles on our faces. The board of the synagogue has, and will continue to, try to provide that lift. Prior to the High Holy Days, we loaned prayer books to enable congregants to easily participate in our virtual Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services and gave out gift bags containing apples, honey, honey cake, and recipes.

We want to continue attempts to uplift the lives of our synagogue family prior to the Pesach Holiday. We are offering the loan of a family Haggadah and a gift bag containing matzo and a sweet treat. The Haggadah will be *Mishkan HaSeder*, the one the synagogue will use for the second Seder on Zoom and will distribute one per family. There are limited copies so it will be “first come-first served.” If you wish to purchase additional copies for your family the book is available [from CCAR Press for \\$21.95](#) or a [Kindle version from Amazon for \\$9.99](#).

FROM THE PRESIDENT

As I write this, vaccine administration is continuing. In addition to front-line workers, the University has started vaccinating the general public based on age guidelines provided by the state. Many of our congregants are older, and I know of at least 4 congregants who have received their first shot, and are already scheduled for their second shot. This is great news!

A third vaccine is poised to request FDA approval, a single shot that does not need special cold storage. This would greatly increase the vaccine availability.

Going back to my last month's column proposing Service as a theme, please consider getting your vaccine when it is offered to you. Helping us attain herd immunity would be a very valuable service to the community, as well as protecting your own health.

The bad news is that there are more contagious variants spreading. Many medical professionals are recommending either an N95 mask if you can get them, or double-masking with a medical mask under a cloth mask. We will be keeping an eye on the infection rates and following the best medical advice as we review our reopening criteria, and will keep you informed as decisions are made.

We are moving forward with building updates. At the last board meeting approval was given to purchase livestreaming equipment so we can continue to broadcast services from the building after we return to in-person services. Needed

repairs to the freezer and refrigerator will be scheduled, and we are moving forward with finalizing bids for installing some of the security updates. By the time we reopen, our new door access system should be functional! Doing all of this work is much easier and more convenient while the building is not occupied, to prepare us for our eventual reopening. By the time we reopen, our building should have all of the safety updates installed that were recommended by our Safety committee!

Our next major holiday is Pesach. Unfortunately an in-person community second Seder will not be possible, but once again the rabbi will lead a zoom Seder from her home. We are planning Passover gift bags to distribute to the congregation, along the lines of our High Holiday gift bags (but without honeycake!) We have ordered some copies of the new URJ Haggadah which will be available to loan to congregants on a first-come-first-served basis, details will be forthcoming. .

There is also a lot of programming going on via zoom. We just had a wonderful all Iowa Shabbat Shira musical service, and there are a number of fantastic adult education programs in the works; watch the bulletin and the weekly email for details.

Don't let your guard down, stay safe, stay healthy!

Emily Sinnwell was born and raised in Iowa where, at a young age, she assisted refugee families in assimilating into the United States and volunteered with the Des Moines Catholic Worker House. In 2006, Emily served as a nurse in Chiapas, Mexico. Four years ago, she co-founded the Iowa City Catholic Worker House which provides hospitality and accompaniment to refugees. In 2018 she joined the University of Iowa College of Nursing as a faculty member. She is a dually prepared family and psychiatric nurse practitioner. She currently works in both family practice and psychiatry settings. For the past four years, she has worked extensively with migrant farmworkers across Iowa, providing both direct patient care and serving as Clinical Director of a federally qualified health center. In 2015 the Migrant Clinicians Health Network named her as one of 30 clinicians who have dedicated their lives to migrant health and made a major difference in the lives of refugees and migrants.
