FROM THE RABBI Esther Hugenholtz

In Tractate Gittin 56, there is a story that reads like a political thriller. Jerusalem is under siege during the first Jewish-Roman War. The Jerusalemite community is torn apart by extremist zealots who wish to exact hard vengeance on the Roman occupier while a pragmatist young rabbi called Yochanan ben Zakkai is trying to see beyond the immediate calamity and strategize for the future. Rabbi Yochanan realizes that Jerusalem is lost and that the Temple will fall. He needs to get out and build an alternative community. Through a ruse, by hiding in a coffin, he manages to smuggle himself beyond the walls of the Holy City and then journeys to confront the Roman General Vespasian. Either through prophetic insight or political cunning, he predicts that Vespasian will become the next Emperor. When this comes to pass only moments later, the new Emperor is so impressed with the sage that he grants him three wishes. To which he replies, 'give me Yavneh and its sages.' Yavneh was a sleepy and unassuming little town in ancient Israel, but it was the seat of the embryonic Sanhedrin, the Jewish 'Supreme Court' and a center

of rabbinic learning. Yavneh became code for a new beginning after all-encompassing trauma, for a paradigm shift that will allow Judaism to rise like a Phoenix from the ashes.

We know how the story ends: Jerusalem burns, the Temple is destroyed but in the study halls of Yavneh, a new Judaism was forged to withstand the trials of the ages. It is the Judaism we still live and breathe today.

I neither have political cunning or prophetic insight (I can't imagine two worse careers for a rabbi!), but I think many of us feel in our kishkes, our gut, that we are standing at the precipice of a new beginning. Something has shifted in the wake of the pandemic. We are asking new questions and seeking deeper meaning. We have seen our moral world tilt on its axis and are wondering what is next. As we inch slowly but surely towards herd immunity through vaccination (please God!) and as the days both warm up and lengthen, a sense of

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creative optimism is returned to us. It's time for a paradigm shift, perhaps. It is time for our 'Yavneh.'

This month is a time of transitions. America is opening up again; the vaccine is widely available (did you get your shot yet? It's a mitzvah!) The sun is shining and we feel the everyday delights of living a little more keenly. It is also a time of change at the synagogue. President Sue Weinberg and her Board will finish their term (and there I was, luring in Sue to the Presidency with the promise 'oh, it will be easy. Nothing major will happen.'...) and a new Board will be instated. As the Rabbi and as a Jew, I am so grateful to our amazing lay leadership for shepherding the community through this bizarre and testing time. This was virgin territory for all of us and we met it with grace and grit. We learned a whole new genre of digital communication, built community in new ways and took care of each other. I am so proud that so many of us made it through without contracting the virus. Dear Board and Executive Committee: you are rock stars. Thank you for your dedicated, wise and unprecedented service.

WARM UP AMERICA

Warm Up America Welcomes You

Knitting and even crocheting have seen a resurgence during COVID. Have you wanted to start knitting or crocheting again but feared that your skills were too "rusty," or wondered what you'd make?

Do you have some left-over yarn from long-ago projects? You don't want to throw it away. Marie Kondo says that if it's not bringing you joy, then out it goes; but you don't want to waste it.

Warm Up America [WUA] can help. Its volunteers across the United States create handmade knit and crochet afghans for people who have lost their homes, fled abusive situations, or are being cared for in shelters, hospitals, or other facilities. Last year, our group distributed over 4 dozen afghans locally, including Shelter House, Domestic Violence Intervention Project, Habitat for Humanity, Ronald McDonald House, and Cedar Rapids after the derecho. Agudas Achim's congregants, family members, friends, and people in the community knit or crochet 7" x 9" rectangles in synthetic yarn [because other fibers shrink]. Being small, the rectangles are quickly completed AND use up leftover yarn. WUA members also help people refresh their knitting and crocheting skills one-on-one, during Sunday get-togethers and beyond, and provide starter kits.

Please consider joining us in the Agudas Achim parking lot on Sunday morning, June 13 and/or June 27, between 10:30 a.m. and noon.

Too busy for a Sunday get-together? Interested, but hesitant to try knitting, crocheting, or crohooking the rectangles, or assembling afghans? You can help WUA by leaving skeins of synthetic yarn in the office. Or you can support us by making a donation to Tikun Olam and WUA, for our yarn purchases.

We thank you in advance for supporting this project benefiting our community. And we hope to see you on June 13 or June 27, 10:30 a.m.



I'm one of those people who doesn't even like to watch someone inflate a balloon because I'm always waiting for it to explode. (I am grateful to my husband and daughter for blowing up many, many balloons over the years, including for Shavuoth.) But, this time, instead of flinching, I felt my heart leap each time a balloon popped. It sounded like fire crackers or like the celebratory breaking of a wine glass. *Bang* sounded like a long, dark COVID winter breaking open at last.

I know that we are not out of the danger yet. I know that new surges of infections and vaccineresistant strains of the virus may await us. But I can't help but feel hopeful about next year.

MISSING PLAQUE

We'd like to put out an APB for a missing plaque that has historical significance for Agudas Achim, and a great deal of meaning for a former synagogue couple. The plaque in question is one that was presented to Agudas Achim by the Chaus, a "boat family" whom we sponsored when they came to lowa City in 1980, as refugees from Vietnam. The plaque, presented to the congregation when the family returned to lowa City after 25 years, was in the upstairs social hall of the synagogue on Washington Street, and was somehow 'lost' in the move to Oakdale Boulevard. Tamara and David Schoenbaum, who were instrumental in overseeing the Chaus' support, say they recall that the plaque was "engraved on brass with an appreciative message and date." The size was a standard stationery size, eight and a half by eleven. So that's what we're looking for!
