FROM THE RABBI Esther Hugenholtz

When the night is the shortest and the moon is darkest... that is when we light Hanukkah candles. I do not think it is a coincidence that the integration of the solar and lunar cycles gives us a winter solstice festival in which we emphasize light and bring in light, close to the waning of the moon.

Light and dark, waxing and waning, feel present to us now. As our President shared his heartfelt words, we are still on our own timelines of emotional 'waxing and waning', trying to find our footing but also slowly growing in our healing and our resilience. We are no longer who we were before October 7, and it is impossible to know what lies ahead. Each of us walks a unique path. Some of us have family and friends in the region, others do not. Like the waxing and waning of the moon, our relationship to Israel, to Judaism, to each other is in flux, and often cyclical, spiralling through the key moments of our lives.

Still, we know we can always come 'home'; to our collective home of the Jewish people and our communal home here at Agudas Achim. When the Maccabees reclaimed the Temple, they too had to adjust to new realities. Temple worship had fallen out of use for two years due to the Seleucid Greeks overpowering the sacred site. The Maccabees came in, bearing palm fronds, willow branches, myrtle and citron, the symbols of a deferred Sukkot. I am trying to imagine what those ancient pilgrims must have found. The Temple, not quite destroyed, but defiled. Their world turned upside-down, their Jewishness in hiding and repressed under the autocratic rule of Antiochus Epiphanes IV. We often

look to the Maccabees as testaments of strength and victory. But they too must have had doubts; they too picked up the broken pieces of their lives as they swept the shards off the sanctuary floor. They too must have wondered: now what?

The Hanukkah miracle may not be just about Divine Intervention (or dare I say: about Divine Intervention at all). I think it is a tale about not the miracles of God but the wonders of the human spirit. Resilience. Solidarity. Justice. Vision. Moral imagination. Hope. Each of the oil lamps on that ancient candelabra can be seen to represent those values. Each of them requires the fuel generated in the human heart. We are our own miracles.

While we are a synagogue affiliated with both the Reform and Conservative movements, I will bring in the thought of the founder of a third denomination, Reconstructionism. Rabbi Mordecai Kaplan defined God as 'the power that makes for salvation.' Orienting his theology to the human spirit and to the civilizational project of Judaism, he brought a new confidence and sensitivity rooted in humanity and humanitarianism without ever abdicating his Jewish commitments. We can absolutely do the same. In some ways, we are the ones who bring salvation, and the expansiveness and generosity of our own souls is where we encounter the Divine.

There is a lot to do for us to 'regroup' as a community in these uncertain times. But we have survived so much, and we are thriving, and we are resilient. It is up to us to find ways to have

courageous conversations, to hold space for our moral commitments, even and especially if they clash between us. We embrace the value of makhloket, sacred disagreement. The historical tale of the Hasmoneans is not necessarily a pretty one; consolidating secular and sacred power (what we would call 'separation of synagogue and state'), they became increasingly authoritarian, theocratic and corrupt. But they also laid the basic for Rabbinic Judaism; for a culture of challenge and debate, of menshlikeit (humanity) among disagreement, of holding each other close while exploring and celebrating our difference. This is the task set before us; this is the moral character we

are encouraged to refine. Like olives upon the press, difficult times can extract from us clarity and purity, allowing our flames to burn bright.

We must beware of simple narratives and relish the complexity of each other. Come celebrate with us; debate with us, daven (pray) with us, learn with us. Our Hanukkah programming is shaping up and we have a long and cozy winter ahead. We will do what Jews have always done so well: defy the darkness and dance into the light. Literally – with our live Klezmer band and our piping-hot latkes. Please volunteer, sign up, join, bring your friends, laugh, sit, schmooze, nosh—and hold each other close, like light candles in the night. The light will grow.

FROM THE PRESIDENT David Lubaroff

As we approach the end of the secular year of 2023, I think back on the past 11 months and its ups and downs. I am amazed at the strength and resiliency of the Agudas Achim Congregation. All of us have experienced the good and the not so good, but we all came out the wiser and stronger. Early in the year we were still adjusting to the post-COVID world and how it has affected Agudas Achim. We have gone from many congregants attending services remotely on Zoom and low attendance at the synagogue to the reverse. The sounds of many voices davening and singing fills the sanctuary and social hall, something that was missing for three years. This has been true for Shabbat and holiday services as well as social events.

We experienced a dark time where there was unnecessary friction, but listening to our congregants at scheduled listening posts and seeking the advice of many of the synagogue's past presidents brought us back into a lighter, better time. Much of the credit for moving past the stress belongs to both the spiritual and lay leadership, working hard to communicate with one another for the good of the congregation.

The transition from the administration led by then President Janice Weiner and many of her board members to the current administration led by yours truly and the new board has been smooth and productive. Rabbi Hugenholtz has blossomed as she enjoys the sacred partnership of she and the lay leaders of the new board. The positive results of the partnership have been many, but especially evidenced by the highly successful High Holiday services. The synagogue returned to having separate conservative and reform services that accommodates our diverse membership. Attendance was up from the last few years and again we all enjoyed the sounds of many voices.

While I am on the subject of services, we are extremely blessed to have many volunteers that support our rabbi and gladly step in to help lead both holiday and Shabbat services. Without naming

individuals, I am sure many of you know the few that will occasionally lead Friday night and Saturday morning Shabbat services and the many that played important roles in the recent High Holiday services. We are indebted to them for their talents and availability. Our synagogue could not function without the three paid staff: our Administrator, Secretary, and Principal. They work hard to keep us going in the right direction.

We all felt so good following Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur through the early days of Sukkot. It was like a huge weight had been lifted from our shoulders and the congregation had turned the corner into a happier time at Agudas Achim. But our happiness came to an abrupt end on Simchat Torah, October 7, 2023, following the invasion of Israel by Hamas. The barbaric killing of Israelis and the capture and taking hostage of men, women, and children was like a knife slicing part of me away. My Jewish cousins thousands of miles away were under siege at an unprecedented level in the 75 years of Israel's existence. Israel struck back with brutal air and land attacks with the goal of ridding Gaza of the Hamas terrorists. These attacks have resulted in the killing many of the guilty, but also of innocent Palestinians. The events have led to the expression of differences about loss of life on both sides of the conflict. This adds to our unrest. We are also seeing an increase in antisemitism, nationally and internationally. Israel's right to defend itself resulting in the current IDF actions in Gaza has awakened both latent and active antisemitic behavior. The combination of mourning and fear has replaced our post-holiday joy with a return to stress in our congregation. Rabbi Hugenholtz has, and will continue, to reach out to congregants to let them know she is available for pastoral support now and in the future.

What of the future? What do we expect in 2024? As I, a Jew, look at the future, I pray that Israel will prevail in eliminating the Hamas organization and allow Gaza to be governed by non-militant,

reasonable Palestinians. I pray for a permanent solution to the Arab-Israeli situation with proper living and governing situations for all inhabitants of Israel.

And – what of the future for Agudas Achim? As the president of the synagogue, I am optimistic that we will recover from this dark time and continue to build on our successes. We are led by a wonderful rabbi who is serving our diverse membership with class, enthusiasm, and empathy. She adheres to the traditional as well as new innovations in religious services. We are governed by a remarkable group of people on the Board of Trustees. They work so

well together and support our pledge of *respect* and collaboration. Despite the diversion caused by the Israel conflict, you can expect new and exciting spiritual, educational, and social activities in the coming months and through the years.

I am so very proud to play a small role in making Agudas Achim happy, interactive, supportive, and a home for all Jews. Our Mission Statement states that "We are a vibrant, egalitarian, inclusive Jewish community committed to supporting your ongoing joyful journey with Judaism." It is a pleasure to work with Rabbi Hugenholtz, the office staff, religious school principal and our board. Please join us in moving forward.

SCHOOL NEWS Sonja Spear

"Like, Lashevet means 'sit!'" "Really?" "Uh-huh."

This may not seem like an exciting dialogue to you, but I was thrilled. I looked around to see which student had confided this information to a parent, but all I saw was the synagogue door swinging shut.

I smiled all the way home.

The Sunday School calendar has been so spotty (er, I mean, challenging) this year that I wonder how much the kids are taking in or remembering from session to session. But every so often, the kids hand me a happy surprise, all wrapped up and tied with a ribbon.

We've been leaning into Hebrew and *tefilah* (prayer) a bit more, now that the High Holidays are behind us. Rachael Carlson volunteered to teach Hebrew Through Movement (including *la shevet*). The kids are eating it up. She even taught them the names of all the place settings from *kaf* (spoon) to *tzalahat* (plate) in time for Thanksgiving. (Ask your child to set the holiday table and see how many words they remember!)

The rabbi visited every classroom to teach each class a particular Shabbat prayer. We will use these prayers as a springboard into reading as soon as the students have mastered the sounds and some of the vocabulary.

Meanwhile, Hanukkah is nearly upon us – if you count by Sundays. The littlest kids learned the rules for playing dreidel and made decorations for the school Hanukkah party. Hersh's class joined them in making decorations, but they also learned the

Hebrew for all the major colors. Hersh and Logan's classes are both working on the Hanukkah blessings.

Meanwhile, Mal's class has been digging deeply into the real history of the Hasmoneans and the Temple. Meyer Lehman, who volunteers in the classroom, has added richness to these discussions. The history of Hanukkah is complicated, a story of assimilation (always a bad thing?), violence, and the benefits and hazards of power. The class is happy to debate it all.

At the end of the day, Avery Lehman led the whole school in a rousing rendition of "I Had a Little Dreidel." The kids volunteered things that dreidel might be made of (plastic! food! metal!). Avery improvised a rhyme. They couldn't stump her!

All of that, in just two sessions. The teachers make it all possible. Every session, they approach the students with good humor and kindness. Kids learn better when they feel safe and appreciated. They also learn well when the community is involved. We have been especially lucky that Meyer and Rachael have shared their talents with the school.

I have always believed that Thanksgiving is secretly a Jewish holiday because it combines gratitude with an enormous feast, including traditional dishes that you can't leave off the menu, or else! This Thanksgiving, I will give thanks for the entire community that supports the school when I yoshevet at the Thanksgiving shulhan and heap mashed potatoes on my tzalahat.

Lately, the number of cases of COVID-19 infection have appeared to be lessening, which is of course a good thing. But the virus is still with us, and there have been a handful of patients being admitted to our University Hospitals with the infection. Medical journals are now talking about how the current virus strain has been "clever" and changing (mutating), and the future of the pandemic is uncertain. The important federal health agencies (CDC and FDA) are still strongly recommending that all appropriate persons receive the current (COVID-19) booster shot. Testing kits for the infection are still available at no cost from the federal government, by mail. The rules for the synagogue have not changed. Masking is optional, but it is still best to avoid attending if you are sick with any possibly contagious condition. If conditions change, we will of course let you know as soon as possible.

Additionally, citizens are still being asked to receive the annual influenza vaccine, and the new RSV vaccine, as recommended. These vaccines should now all be available at doctors' offices and pharmacies without much difficulty. Also, don't throw away your masks. There may situations such as travel and being in crowded environments, where masking should be considered.
