### FROM THE RABBI Esther Hugenholtz

This is such a sweet time of year and I am savoring every temperate day before the summer heat hits. Spring in Iowa is idyllic (even if passes in the blink of an eye). My children are in their last week of school and Jewish summer camp beckons and many of us are starting to look forward to summer transitions.

The season of late spring and early summer breathes optimism. Flowers in bloom, the greenery around us still fresh and the temperatures warm rather than scorching. It is a dreamy time; a time for beginnings ripening into their fullness. No wonder the Torah was given in such a season, and as the Midrash reports, Mt. Sinai burst out in bloom.

In our communal life, we also look forward to beginnings ripening into their fullness. Our current Board has come close to fulfilling their two-year term and I could not be more grateful for their leadership. Little did they know that upon their installation in 2023, they would contend with some of the most devastating crises in Jewish history. Their term has not been easy; but they made a hard situation as easy as they could through forbearance, grace, wisdom and genuinely valuing our community's diversity. To hold all that and more was no small feat.

In addition to that, the President and the Board have worked exceedingly hard on updating and strengthening our community. New vision statement, ethics code, code of conduct and ongoing work on our Bylaws. This work is not glamorous but it is absolutely essential for the

health and longevity of our community. It builds into our structures resiliency and transparency and fosters, to quote David Lubaroff one more time, 'respect and collaboration.' As we Jews know, God (rather than the devil!) is in the details. At this 'z'man torateinu', the season of the giving of our Torah, we know the power firsthand of legislation, rule of law, clear structures and a compelling shared vision to build a sacred community. At Sinai too, not all the laws and statutes were 'glamorous', but they were essential to the smooth and just governing of a ripening Israelite society.

Now, it would be too tempting for me to make a David Lubaroff = Moses quip, given both men became leaders as octogenarians, but the comparison is made with sincerity and love. David has been my sacred partner in all things: sometimes we were each other's mentors and sometimes each other's students, but always each other's equals with sensitivity, respect and a fair bit of humor. Like Moses, David has had to navigate challenging dynamics and asserting his leadership through grace rather than force, caring for us all. I myself have been the grateful recipient of his kindness, wisdom and compassion: and he was the one who encouraged me to start working out, so he's been good for my health too!

I am very excited to work with our new Board, carefully and thoughtfully assembled by Lori, our wonderful President-Elect. Lori has a vision and clarity that sees things for what they are and has the compassion to navigate them to a place where

we need to be. It is my honor to serve beside her and her team.

## FROM THE PRESIDENT- FINAL PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE David Lubaroff

### Dear Congregants -

Here we are in June of 2025, at the close of my two years as president of Agudas Achim Congregation. It is my chance to look back, but more importantly, to look forward. My apologies if this message seems disjointed and disorganized but that is the way I feel after attempting to be more together and organized while leading the synagogue through highs and lows. In the Spring of 2021, I was finishing a term as Vice President during Sue Weinberg's presidency and Janice Weiner, as president-elect, was filling out her board during her 2021 to 2023 term as president. When Janice asked if I was interested in the position of president -elect, I considered it an honor and accepted the invitation. For the next two years we worked as a team. I owe a lot to Janice for the wealth of knowledge about running a synagogue in an era of change, how to respond in an atmosphere of

dissent, lack of respect, and bullying. I knew then that my presidency was going to be very different from what it was when I was at the helm in 1981-1983. I was 83 years old when I accepted the position of president-elect and most of my family and friends thought I was crazy. They knew that I would be 85 when I became president and 87 when I completed my term. I have been called crazy throughout my life by many and perhaps there is some truth there. I am an emotional, caring, and caregiving person which may, at times feel a little crazy.

So why have I been on this track for four years? As president-elect, I witnessed some terrible behavior by people I respected. People that made things difficult for Rabbi Hugenholtz, Janice Weiner, and others and caused disruptions in the governance and religious activities at Agudas Achim. I accepted

Janice's invitation with several goals, eliminating the chaos being at the top of the list. The others include working with our rabbi and the board in a previously described *sacred partnership*.

In some of my past bulletin messages, I wrote about the importance of forming a board of trustees with congregants who would work collegially to foster an atmosphere of *respect & collaboration* that would move the synagogue forward in a positive way. That tone was set during the first of two board retreats. In the two years, this board has accomplished many things that include development of a mission/vision statement, an ethics code, and a code of conduct. The current synagogue by-laws document is out of date and a new one is being developed, and programs to engage seniors and interfaith families are works in progress.

When Janice was president, she and I met every two weeks with Rabbi Hugenholtz, the goal being to review actions taken, discuss plans for future actions, troubleshoot when problems arose, and more. No topic was out of bounds. These biweekly meetings have continued during the last two years with Jeanne Cadoret and then Lori McMann as presidents elect. The discussions make for a smooth process in which issues are then taken to the executive committee and ultimately, the board. Progress is made with this system because the rabbi and lay leaders have multiple opportunities to strengthen current issues and develop new programs. Words cannot rightfully express my appreciation for this system and the people working within it. Everyone has the same goal, to maintain, as well as build, a strong synagogue that provides many spiritual, educational, and social opportunities for our congregants.

July 1<sup>st</sup> is a transition date with a new president and board to continue working toward these goals.


Having worked closely with Lori McMann this past

year, I know that she also has these goals. She will be a leader that will work hard and develop a positive relationship with her board to lead us through the next two years. Please give her your support.

## ADULT EDUCATION Lisa Heineman

June 21 Lunch & Learn: Lisa Heineman will talk about "Jewish Frameworks for Social Justice."

This'll be my last Bulletin entry as Chair of Adult Ed – what an amazing ride it's been! Thanks to the committee members who brainstormed ideas & did the legwork to ensure that our programming went smoothly.

Over the last two years Adult Ed has collaborated with Iowa City Jews (our Public Space Judaism initiative) to create new programs like the Peace & District Seder, Big Ideas in Jewish Books, Torah for our Times, and the Urban Shavu'ot Retreat. We've collaborated with Tikkun Olam on events addressing themes like immigration and trans lives. We had programming on Israel/Palestine ranging from a travelogue from wartime Israel to a pop-up exhibit and workshop on the Nakba. We've had countless oneg and Sabbath kiddush talks by members of the congregation, and we've hosted two guest scholars: Rabbi Micah Streiffer and Prof. Samira Mehta.

As many of you know, I'm an educator at heart. During the same period I chaired Adult Ed, I co-created (and now co-direct) a new Jewish Studies Program at The University of Iowa. Both of those duties coincided with my work towards a Certificate in Unbound Judaism from the UnYeshiva, which involved creating and facilitating a retreat called "Dreaming in Jewish" for the larger community. (I'll reprise it for the congregation in the lead-up to the High Holidays.) The synergies among these three communities – the congregation, my university students, and the UnYeshiva – have made these last two years incredibly rewarding for me. In a world with plenty to worry about, I'm ever so grateful to our congregational community for being a place that welcomes innovation, exploration – and even disagreement, for the sake of heaven.



## Recommended summer activity! Get acquainted with your Agudas Achim Library!

## What kind of books are in our library and how are they organized?

- Our books have relevance to "Jewish information, education, enrichment, culture and recreation/entertainment".
- 3500+ books are shelved according to the Dewey Decimal Classification (DDC)\* system.
- Our catalogue of materials is recorded digitally in Readerware, and printouts of the catalogue are in the Braverman Library.

### Where are our books located?

- Youth books are shelved in the central area outside the religious school classrooms and are organized in three sections- Holidays, Young Children, Tweens and Teens
- Adult books are shelved in the Braverman
   Library and the Becker Adult Learning Center.
  - In the Braverman Library, there are adult fiction books, non-fiction books (DDC 000s and through 200s), DVDs, and audio cassettes.
  - In the Becker Adult Learning Center, there are non-fiction books (DDC 300s through 900s), biographies, and scholarly books for in depth study of Jewish texts.

### May I borrow a book? How and when?

 Yes! Fill out the checkout card in the back of the book with the date, your name, and your email.
 Leave the card in one of the checkout card receptacles.

- Return the book when done (or within six months, please) to the returns area in the Braverman Library.
- It's the honor system so the library is always open.

### How are books acquired for our library?

- New books are purchased using money donated to the Library Fund. Please consider donating!
- Book donations are accepted if the content is relevant to "Jewish information, education, enrichment, culture and recreation/ entertainment".
- New books for youth are regularly added through our partnership with PJLibrary.

### What is the Library Committee?

- It is an "Appointed Committee" charged with keeping the library organized and functioning.
- Its current members include Becky Gelman, Rabbi Portman, Esther Retish, Hannah Sandler, and Teresa Weiner.
- It communicates with the congregation in the synagogue's monthly bulletin and with table displays at the door to the Braverman Library.
